



Some of our guests may not have transport to the Golf Club so if you can offer them a lift we would be really grateful. (If you need a lift please make it known)









BEVAN, John

Welsh, b. December 1943. Neat, solid build, soft lilting voice, moustache. Learned to dive Llanelli in teens. Founder and vice-chairman, Southsea branch, British Sub-Aqua Club. Formerly employed at Royal Naval Physiological Laboratory. One-time world record holder for depth dive, made during 15 days in 1970, at simulated depth of 1500 feet. Various other physiological experiments: claims to have 'one of the bestdocumented bodies in Britain'. Now part of research team and 'diving capability' of large commercial diving company, London, trains professional divers. Unmarried.







Holy Trinity Church is a fitting venue for John's funeral. It is the church in which one of his historical heroes, John Deane, worshipped during the 1840s and it is where Deane's wife, Agnes, is buried. In 2011 John was instrumental in installing a memorial stone to Agnes in the grounds of the church under the aegis of The Historical Diving Society.

John has requested no flowers, but would welcome donations to The Historical Diving Society of which he was Chairman from its founding in 1980 until the day he died. He was passionate about preserving and promoting diving history. During his tenure the Society has grown from strength to strength with sister Societies all over the world and in 2010, it established The Diving Museum in Gosport. The Society and Museum are run entirely by volunteers to whom he regularly expressed his deep gratitude for their hard work and dedication. He wanted nothing more than to see the Society continue to flourish.
